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Lorrie A. Clemo, Ph.D. DRIVEN TO SERVE OTHERS

The sight of a woman leading D'Youville College is not an unusual one. In its 109-year history, 14 women have guided the college.

What is different about D'Youville's new president, Lorrie A. Clemo, Ph.D., is that she is not a woman of a religious order. Dr. Clemo was introduced on Dec. 6, 2016, as D'Youville's 15th president, and the college's first lay leader. She recognizes this is a major change, as she succeeds longtime president, Sister Denise A. Roche, GNSH, Ph.D., who retired last June after leading the college for nearly 37 years.

What Dr. Clemo has in common with her predecessors is the desire to serve others. She sees herself as a servant leader.

"I am deeply driven to help others," she told *D'Mensions*.

"I'm really excited about coming to D'Youville because I think it's a wonderful fit with the history and tradition of the college and its mission of service to others. That's what I have spent my entire career doing; that is what I am most passionate about."

Dr. Clemo is excited about assuming the presidency this January. "The first order of business will be to ask the campus to share their thoughts with me in order to get a clear sense of where the college stands today, what the needs of the college are in the days, months and years to come and to solicit ideas to inform what will become our new vision and goals for the future."

"I will also share my initial thoughts about what I see as strengths of the college that will help us sharpen and focus our mission. My goal is to position D'Youville as a model institution that ensures student success and impactful service to others, which is at the core of our mission. In the process, I want to build a stronger culture within the college community that encourages bold thinking and actions to

improve peoples lives, and solve the complex challenges we face in our local and global communities."

She said that from this process will come new vision, new goals, and a renewed emphasis on creating compelling opportunities for students, faculty, staff, alumni and the surrounding community. She aims to lead D'Youville in exciting new directions, while remaining true to its core strengths including its rich array of innovative educational programs, excellent faculty and dedicated staff, and its penetrating culture of resiliency.

When asked what motivates her, Dr. Clemo responded that helping the community grow and prosper, and supporting individuals so they achieve their goals gives her direction and drive.

The presidency of D'Youville is a natural next step for Dr. Clemo, who said she wanted to lead an institution that mirrors her personal and professional values. D'Youville, she said, is the perfect fit.

"I really see D'Youville as the institution that most aligned with my commitment to a holistic, value driven Catholic education." She said she sees the college living out those values every day through its students, staff, faculty and alumni.

While talking with the Presidential Search Committee, she asked, "What do you want D'Youville graduates to be known for?"

They told me that they want them to be highly competent in their selected fields of study but more importantly, they want every graduate to be known as a compassionate and caring individual. That spoke to me more than any other college I have been involved with, and harkened me back to my days of catholic undergraduate education. It was clear to me that D'Youville lives and breaths its mission. Every D'Youville graduate, no matter what profession they choose or where in the world they live, is expected to be a caring and compassionate individual who makes an imprint on the world that is both important and impactful."

That's why I want to be here. I want to be part of advancing this community and increasing the number of people we touch, who through their efforts as D'Youville alumni, will make the world a better place."

D'Youville's Catholic identity is also very important to Dr. Clemo. "As a practicing Catholic, I will be working hard to protect the college's Catholic mission and identity, working very closely with the new vice president for mission integration, Rev. Dr. Robert J. Perelli, CJM. The Catholic heritage of D'Youville is at the core of its mission and together we will continue to preserve the values and traditions of D'Youville College as a Catholic institution, including being

Dr. Clemo plans to devote a considerable amount of time during the early part of her presidency reaching out to D'Youville alumni. "It is important to connect with as many alumni as possible, to get a good understanding of the past in order to shape a future vision for the college," she said. "I want to establish an atmosphere where old traditions and new ideas enrich each other. I'll be asking alumni to share their personal stories and memories of college traditions to ensure that successful educational practices from the past will be carried forward, so that future alumni will be successful professionals and prepared to make a positive impact on the global community."

The reputation of a college is built through its alumni. Meeting with alumni will give me an understanding of the impact the college has had on their lives and what we can do better going forward to enhance the student experience to not only build our reputation but to improve the personal development, fulfillment, success and happiness of our graduates."





ROBERT M. BENNETT

Bennett, previously served on the Board of Regents of the State Education Department for the Eighth Judicial District for 20 years and was elected chancellor in 2002. In 2009 he stepped down as chancellor and continued to serve as a regent representing Western New York until 2015. The Board of Regents unanimously appointed him chancellor emeritus, a lifetime title.

Bennett was president and CEO of the United Way of Buffalo and Erie County for 15 years.

He is chairman of the Statler Foundation and a trustee of the John R. Oishei Foundation. Bennett serves on the board of directors for Catholic Charities, is a

member of the Buffalo Diocesan Planning Commission and the Bishop's Council on Catholic Education for Western New York.

A graduate of the University of Notre Dame, he earned a master's degree from the University at Buffalo. He completed the leadership program for not-for-profit CEOs at Harvard and the University of Michigan.

Bennett has taught at the graduate level since 1977 and currently is a visiting professor at Canisius College.

D'YOUVILLE HOSTS PHYSICAL THERAPY REGIONAL STUDENT CONCLAVE

On Saturday, September 10, 2016, D'Youville College hosted the 2016 WNY PT/PTA Regional Student Conclave. Physical Therapy and Physical Therapy Assistant students from eight colleges, including D'Youville College, University at Buffalo, Daemen College, Niagara County Community College, Genesee Community College, Nazareth College, Utica College, and the State University of New York Upstate Medical University, attended the regional student conclave.

The keynote speakers were Matthew Hyland, PT, Ph.D., MPA and Jacob I. McPherson, PT, DPT, NCS, MSCS.

Dr. Hyland spoke on "Transforming Society: An Evolutionary Journey." A physical therapist with more than 24 years of experience as a clinician, private practice owner, educator and advocate, Dr. Hyland is the immediate past president of the New York Physical Therapy Association (NYPTA) and a member of the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) board of Directors. He is committed to helping educate the next generation of physical therapists and frequently speaks on topics

ranging from health care administration/ management and health policy to issues in health care, ethics and orthopedics.

Dr. McPherson is the current legislative chairperson for the New York Physical Therapy Association (NYPTA) and a member of their board of directors, where he strives to advance and protect the physical therapy profession across New York State. Dr. McPherson spoke on "NYPTA 101: An Intro to Your Profession."

The conclave also featured discussions and presentations on a variety of topics throughout the day, including concussion, ACL, private practice, hippotherapy, aquatic therapy and military PT.

The WNY PT/PTA Regional Student Conclave was organized by a committee of students and professors at D'Youville. D'Youville students Patrick Barber and Jeff Spors were inspired to develop the event after attending the APTA National Student Conclave in the fall of 2015 in Omaha, Neb. At that conclave, the two developed connections with other students and began the brainstorming

process to plan a student conclave in Western New York.

Faculty members Dr. Sarah Pictor, Dr. Patricia Nowakowski and Dr. Joseph Baumgarden were also on the planning team. With a combined, 25+ years of experience teaching and countless hours of physical therapy practice, ranging from outpatient care to pediatrics to neurology, they had developed connections with experts not only in their areas of expertise but in numerous other areas of physical therapy. They leveraged these connections to fill the conclave with the top presenters from Western New York.

Dr. Nowakowski said, "It was invigorating to see all of the energy during the many months of conclave planning, which blossomed into an interactive exchange of ideas and networking among the students and the guest speakers. At the conclave luncheon, we were honored to have Dr. Hyland and Dr. McPherson present at D'Youville College while they conveyed meaningful messages to the future doctors of physical therapy and physical therapy assistants."

The conclave was sponsored by the NYPTA. The luncheon was provided by D'Youville dietetic students under the supervision of Clinical Assistant Professor Linda Mocny.

In addition to the talks, attendees were able to network and speak to local representatives from G&G Fitness and Catholic Health. Proceeds from the registrations and a raffle held on the day of the event benefited a local organization, Stone's Buddies. Stone's Buddies, operates through Women & Children's Hospital of Buffalo, provides a network of resources to support children and families of children who are chronically ill. A donation of \$1,976.00 was made on behalf of the 2016 WNY PT/PTA Regional Student Conclave.



THE ART & SCIENCE OF MISSION INTEGRATION

Rev. Dr. Robert J. Perelli, CJM, Vice President of Mission Integration

About 20 minutes after I was appointed the first-ever vice president of mission integration, the questions started: "What is mission integration?" and "What does a mission officer do?"

Let me try to answer those questions.

The Catholic Intellectual Tradition—the Church's age old search for truth, beauty and justice—has a long and prestigious history in the United States. Foremost among its accomplishments are 261 Catholic colleges and universities founded by a variety of Catholic religious communities.

Since the leader of each college or university was always a member of the founding religious community, the mission was integral to the decision-making process. As one educator cleverly put it, the mission was "part of the DNA" of each college president. D'Youville College, founded in 1908 by the Grey Nuns, was no exception.

However, with the precipitous decline in the membership of all religious communities in the US, Catholic colleges in Western New York and around the country have transitioned to a new form of leadership.

While the office of president is now being entrusted to a highly credentialed and talented laywoman, college trustees created a brand new position—the mission officer—in order to preserve and promote the unique mission of each institution of higher education. Here at D'Youville this new office was given a certain gravitas by endowing the **Sr. Denise Roche Center of Mission Integration** and making the mission officer a vice president.

As vice president of mission integration, I serve as a member of the president's council and work closely with the president and vice presidents of institutional advancement, academics, student affairs and finance. I am charged with bringing the mission to the faculty, administration, staff, students, parents, alumni and the local community. When faced with important decisions about academics, finances or outreach, the mission officer helps the entire D'Youville community ask how the mission influences their choices.

In the words of my job description, the mission officer and center develop a "consciousness of the Catholic Grey Nun mission and ensures its implementation and integration into the D'Youville community and the integration of the mission into the strategic plan."

The end results of mission integration are well-educated graduates who have reached their highest academic potential and who are committed to the common good of the community.

Now that you know what "mission integration" is and what a "mission officer" does, you can see why I love my new job!

CENTER FOR GLOBAL INITIATIVES

Ron Dannecker, associate vice president for global admissions and strategic partnerships, was eager to discuss D'Youville's new Center for Global Initiatives. It brings international student services, global admissions, study abroad, and the intensive English program (formerly English as a Second Language) all together under one roof.

Ron is especially excited about the intensive English program, which will allow D'Youville to expand international admissions and increase enrollment of international students.

Laryssa Petryshyn was appointed the associate vice president for global education in August. In this position, she will supervise international student services, study abroad, and the intensive English program. She also serves as the college's primary designated school official, ensuring compliance with all Department of Homeland Security regulations and serving as liason with multiple government agencies.

Laryssa helped to grow D'Youville's study abroad program from 15 students a year to over 50, and helped to develop a new four-level intensive English program. She previously served D'Youville as the director of the international student office from 2004-2016, and as an international/transfer admissions counselor from 2002-2004.

Laryssa is a graduate of the University at Buffalo, with a bachelor of arts degree in political science and a master's degree in social science in interdisciplinary studies. Randyll P. Bowen has been hired as associate vice president for enrollment management and marketing. He is responsible for the overall management of undergraduate and graduate recruitment and marketing as well as the planning, implementation, and administration of programs and services in support of students and staff. Bowen has also taken on the oversight of web services at the college.

Bowen is a graduate of the State University College at Brockport and received his master's degree in student personnel administration from the University at Buffalo. He is pursuing his doctorate in education in organizational development, with an emphasis in higher education leadership, at Grand Canyon University in Phoenix.

Sam D'Amato was appointed assistant dean for assessment.

In his new position, D'Amato continues to serve both administration and faculty, collaborating with various offices on the design and implementation of assessment plans. On the academic side, his background in instructional design and educational leadership helps him to assist faculty in the assessment of D'Youville's curricular programs, courses, and student learning.

D'Amato is a graduate of Niagara University and received a master's degree in educational administration and supervision from Canisius College. He is currently working toward his Ed.D. in educational leadership at D'Youville.

Dr. Bethany C. Dunn, PA-C, DC, has been named chair of the physician assistant department.

A graduate of the University of Pittsburgh, Dr. Dunn earned her Doctor of Chiropractic degree from the New York Chiropractic College and her Physician Assistant degree, summa cum laude, from D'Youville. She was a physician assistant at Buffalo Cardiology and Pulmonary Associates and was a preceptor for D'Youville, Daemen College, and the University at Buffalo.

Dr. Dunn has more than 13 years of clinical practice experience and specializes in pulmonary medicine. She is a member of Pi Alpha Honor Society, the American Academy of Physician Assistants, New York State Society of Physician Assistants, WNY Physician's Assistant Association, and the Association of Family Practice Physician Assistants.

Steven Fink was named program coordinator for the veterans outreach and support services program at D'Youville. He will work in the Veterans Affairs Office, assisting with outreach and recruitment efforts in support of military service members, veterans, and family members seeking postsecondary education, and establishing networks for those in transition both educationally and professionally.

Steven is a graduate of D'Youville's Advance program and is enrolled in the MBA program. Most recently he held a position in veteran's affairs at Geneseo Community College. Steven has served with the US Army, having done three tours of duty overseas.

Molly Flynn assumed the role of associate vice president for grants and professional development. In this role, she oversees the grants and professional development offices, both of which are responsible for supporting the college as an institution, as well as individual faculty and staff members, in seeking external funding.

The offices provide assistance with editorial and substantive advice in the pursuit and implementation of grants, and also develop and operate D'Youville's professional development programs, including noncredit courses and programs, community-based education, customized training for business and industry, and special events and conferences.

Molly graduated from Miami University of Ohio with a bachelor of arts degree in sociology. She received her master's degree in higher education administration from SUNY Buffalo, and is now enrolled in the higher education administration doctoral program at The George Washington University with expected graduation in fall 2017.



FORMER PRINCIPAL OF HOLY ANGELS ACADEMY DIES Was Also Professor of English & Archivist at D'Youville College

Sister Mary Kathleen Duggan, Grey Nun of the Sacred Heart, died on November 15, 2016 at Lafayette Redeemer in the 67th year of her religious life. She was 90 years old.

Prior to entering the Grey Nuns of the Sacred Heart in 1949 she taught English and Latin at Holy Angels Academy (HAA) for two years after graduating from D'Youville College. She returned to HAA again as teacher in 1973, and later as assistant principal in 1981. Two years later she began twelve years as principal. She was also an instructor at D'Youville College in the 1950's and professor of English from 1962 to 1973. Sister Mary Kathleen returned once more to D'Youville as archivist in 1996, a position she held through 2007. She served as Assistant Superior General for the Grey Nuns of the Sacred Heart from 1975-1979.
