completion of our three-year transition to NCAA Division II athletics, which occurred in July 2023. D'Youville now hosts 19 intercollegiate teams of student athletes and coaches competing in the East Coast Conference. This elevation of play is catalyzing countless new opportunities for student growth, wellbeing, and recruitment. As of the Fall 2023, we are enrolling an exceedingly diverse student body from a larger geographic footprint than ever before, in large part driven by students' interest in playing for a Division II athletics team. We invite you to cheer on our student athletes, in-person, or online—as all our games and competitions are live streamed for viewing from anywhere around the globe.

D'Youville University now consists of students enrolling from 26 states, 18 countries, and with greater than 80% of new students enrolled in health-related majors. This is not only exceptional news for the cultivation of ideas and a vibrant campus culture, but also very beneficial for combating the "enrollment cliff" which is plaguing many colleges and universities in the Northeast with a declining number of secondary students graduating and going to college. While we are fortunate to have new student enrollment return to pre-COVID-19 levels, we must remain vigilant in our efforts to maintain enrollment, so we may continue our objective of empowering people to lead compassionate, productive, and responsible lives.

A second, more comprehensive and longitudinal achievement is the positive re-affirmations of both our 'BBB' investment-grade bond rating and our institution's national accreditation from the Middle States Commission on Higher Education. In August 2023, D'Youville was not only evaluated to be in full compliance but acknowledged with nine commendations of exceptional organizational practice. These results were the outcomes of a seven-year preparation process which engaged hundreds of campus constituents in a culture of continuous improvement. Throughout this process, crosssections of campus teams tirelessly documented, reviewed, assessed, and made improvements to nearly all aspects of the university, in accordance with the guidelines and expectations of the Middle States Commission on Higher Education. D'Youville University now has a clean record moving forward toward our next assessment cycle to commence in 2030.

While these selected highlights are representative of our momentum, it's just the tip of the iceberg. 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UNIVERSITY REACCREDITED

Capping 7-Year Effort

This summer, D'Youville University achieved reaccreditation from the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE).

The process spanned seven years, with the university's extensive self-study conducted by a committee comprising D'Youville administrators, faculty, and staff.

The MSCHE, which first accredited D'Youville in 1928, made nine recommendations but set no conditions for reaffirmation. The commission's on-site evaluation occurred in early April.

"Earning this credential has been a constant at this institution for nearly 100 years," said **Joggeshwar** (**Jogy**) **Das, EdD**, executive vice president and senior advisor to the president. "This news is a testament to our university's dedication to upholding rigorous academic standards and delivering a top-tier educational experience."

This accreditation preserves D'Youville's eligibility to participate in federal financial aid programs, which encompass federal loans, grants, and work-study opportunities administered by the U.S. Department of Education.

"I take great pride in the team effort at D'Youville that maintained focus for many years and deserves credit for seeing the process through to its successful completion," said Das. "This news bolsters our institution's reputation within the academic community—and



strengthens the standing of a D'Youville degree."

A regional accrediting body recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education and the Council for Higher Education Accreditation, the MSCHE assesses institutions of higher education in Delaware, the District of Columbia, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

D'Youville will prepare its next self-study to apply for reaccreditation in 2030.

In 1997, Eddib earned a Doctor of Medicine degree from Tripoli University in Libya. At UB, Eddib completed an obstetrics and gynecology residency, as well as clinical fellowships in advanced pelvic surgery and high-risk pregnancy and robotics. In 2014, she also earned a master's degree in health care administration and management from the Harvard University T.H. Chan School of Public Health.

Nurturing the physical and mental wellness of others was a fundamental conviction of the Grey Nuns and a core principle in the establishment of D'Youville in 1908.

The institution's dedication to these ideals is exemplified by two new academic offerings—the Clinical Psychology Doctoral degree program and the Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselor certification.

"Our country and communities are in critical need for trained practitioners who can address and treat mental health concerns," said **Lorrie Clemo, PhD**, president of D'Youville. "As a health sciencesfocused institution, we must respond and meet the moment."

Keeping Counselors Qualified to Serve

In June 2022, New York State announced modifications for Office of Addiction Services and Support (OASAS) counselors. D'Youville was the first educational institution in New York State to offer "upskilling" opportunities for current professionals to meet the state's new requirements—keeping counselors caring for their patients.

Offered online, the program supports counselors in the field—and accelerates the credentialing of additional professionals at a faster pace. The program's combination of advanced coursework and clinical training hours ensures students are workplace-ready and meet current state guidelines.

To further address the workforce shortage in mental health, the university is partnering with the Beacon Center.

"This partnership will be the perfect springboard for

students, with the university providing a training ground for counselors to learn about treating substance abuse," said **Jacqueline West**, CEO of Beacon Center. "Students will learn how to conduct individual sessions, group sessions, and how to perform evaluations."

Meeting the Urgent Need

Recognizing the need to support Medaille
University students after the institution closed in
August, D'Youville accelerated its efforts to secure
approval for students to enroll this fall into the
university's Clinical Psychology Doctoral program,
which prepares students to become licensed
psychologists while treating patients in supervised
environments.

"With our program already in place, our team was able to quickly move and bring Medaille students and faculty to D'Youville," said Clemo. "We are eager to help students complete their training and degrees, which will place more practitioners in the field, where the need is great."

Online Pharmacy Program Helps Meet National Need

D'Youville Launches the First Three-year Online PharmD in the Country

In response to growing healthcare demands, D'Youville created a Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) program that places graduates into the workforce quickly.

The accelerated program—which welcomed its first cohort of 60 students last fall—allows students to study from anywhere and graduate in three years, instead of the traditional four years, thanks to a year-round class schedule.

"Accelerated programs are what students prefer, and ours is designed for their success," said **Jeremiah Grabowski, PhD,** executive dean of online learning and faculty development. "Most pharmacists are paid six figures—so an extra year in the workforce increases their earning potential."

In recent years, the country has faced a shortage of pharmacists—that is only expected to worsen—along with an aging population and a rise in chronic health conditions.

"The online program is like a family," said PharmD student **Assalah Othman**, who lives in Rensselaer, New York and is a member of the program's Class of 2025. "There's a team behind you that offers much support."

Paving a New Path for Pharmacists

Working with online instructional designers, D'Youville pharmacy faculty constructed the program's academic year to include summers and five days of on-campus training per year. Students are placed in internships in their home communities, which allows them to get hands-on experience and build a professional network.

"The online PharmD program is a tremendous example of how we're able to serve those who otherwise wouldn't be able to access a D'Youville education," said President **Lorrie Clemo, PhD.** "We listened to student needs—many always dreamt of pursuing this degree, and now they can."

A Celebration of Teaching & Research

An annual celebration of the university's commitment to academic excellence, Research and Scholarship Day highlights the dedication of faculty and students in their pursuit of knowledge.

On April 19, students and faculty showcased their latest discoveries and innovations in a diverse range of disciplines, while sharing ideas and perspectives among colleagues and peers. Participants formally and informally presented their findings, discussed their research methodologies, and received feedback and suggestions.

In addition, the event was an opportunity for networking and collaboration—which has led to new research partnerships and projects after previous events of the kind.

"Research and Scholarship Day is a proud D'Youville tradition," said **Renee Cadzow, PhD**, associate director of the Center for Doctoral Studies and Research, which organizes the yearly event. "Among our community, it uniquely promotes a culture of academic excellence, encourages curiosity and a lifelong interest in learning."

Over 50 research topics were presented, with large-screen monitors giving presenters a better experience, more opportunity to share their work, and a more dynamic overall environment.

Remote opportunities allowed students who were unable to physically attend to present their research and fully participate in the experience, which was also open to the public.



Healthcare Trailblazers

Western NY Alumni Excelling in Top Positions



Joyce Markiewicz '80 is the first female chief executive and fifth overall at Catholic Health—the second largest health system in Western New York that employs around 9,000 people.

Markiewicz relies on her long history of patient care to guide her leadership strategy, especially amid constant changes in the healthcare industry.

With an early career rooted in nursing, Markiewicz continues to be guided by her experiences ensuring quality care for patients, before transitioning to home health care.

In 2005, Markiewicz joined Catholic Health as vice president of home care operations and eventually was promoted to the roles of president and CEO of the division.

"I try to be a mentor to women," said Markiewicz. "My nursing program at D'Youville supported my growth in a career that is truly a calling. The faculty and staff were great role models. As a leader at Catholic Health, and as a member of the Board of Trustees at DYU, and as an alum I take this role seriously—and strive to be an example for others."

At **Marjorie Quint-Bouzid's '85** D'Youville graduation ceremony, she told one of her nursing professors that she would return to Buffalo—someday. "I said, 'I'm going to come back and serve this community,' which surprised even me," said Quint-Bouzid, laughing.

Her remark proved prescient. In June, Quint-Bouzid became executive vice president and chief nurse executive at Kaleida Health, which operates Buffalo General Hospital, the John R. Oishei Children's Hospital and others. In her new role, Quint-Bouzid oversees nursing operations across the entire organization, which has nearly 10,000 employees and serves an eight-county area in Western New York. "I suppose I'm fulfilling a promise I had the foresight to make nearly 40 years ago," she said.

As Quint-Bouzid acclimates at Kaleida and establishes priorities, she stepped into the role with an intent to increase partnerships with community organizations through the region that promote healthy living and wellness—"not just preventing sickness," she said.

This philosophy of care and management were established in prior executive roles, with Quint-Bouzid serving as a senior vice president at Parkland Health and Hospital System in Dallas and in leadership positions at Fort Washington Medical Center near Washington, D.C. "I've always aimed to alleviate suffering throughout my career, in different ways," said Quint-Bouzid, "but, no matter what we do, our work is always about helping others feel whole."



Creative Research Powers D'Youville's Im

At D'Youville, a wide range of grants are facilitating advanced faculty research projects—from the lab to the classroom to the community. In fact, the university is securing more grants than at any point during its 115-year history. This recent run of success is allowing the institution to better transform its mission—and aspirations—into reality.

"A diverse mix of organizations are making significant investments in the university—and stand as endorsements of what we're pursuing together," said **Lindsey**Jakiel Diulus, PhD, director of corporate and foundation relations. Diulus added, "We have a powerful North Star and beautiful history we inherit from Saint Marguerite d'Youville and the Grey Nuns, and we seek to continue their commitment to service above self, service to the students and to the community."

In the last fiscal year, D'Youville has secured more than \$10.6 million in grants—from federal, state and local sources.

\$3,966,653 | Brightening the Future

Led by Patricia H. Garman School of Nursing Acting
Dean Shannon McCrory Churchill, DHEd, CPNP-PC,
CNE, D'Youville will expand its hands-on approach
to nursing education and bring medical care to
underserved communities in Erie and Niagara Counties through
a nearly \$4 million Health Resources & Services Administration
(HRSA) grant. "We are entrepreneurial and willing to take
risks to compete for grants that maybe normally wouldn't
go to an institution of our size," said Churchill. "That's part
of our overarching boldness that we strive for at D'Youville."
New nurse-led mobile health units will set up pop-up clinics
in partnership with fire stations and EMS personnel. The
grant will also advance undergraduate nursing education for
those who may experience challenges with
traditional models.

\$2,999,835 | Training Community Health Workers

An additional HRSA grant involves building partnership with several community-based organizations to expand the health workforce.

According to **Renee Cadzow**, **PhD**, associate director of the Center for Doctoral Studies and Research, "Community health workers are trusted members of the communities in which they work—and bridge community and health and social services to improve access, quality and cultural responsiveness." The



grant supports training and apprenticeship programs and academic development.

\$1,535,467 | Identifying Paths to Success

The U.S. Department of Education and Upward
Bound initiative is a national year-round
pre-collegiate program that provides equitable
support for high school students who are of historically
underserved and underrepresented populations. These future
first-generation college students "have the desire, motivation,
and potential to complete high school and enroll in postsecondary education," said **Kissena Frazier, MSW**, director of
Upward Bound at D'Youville and a first-generation graduate
who is leading the grant. "We're striving to make an impact

on the next generation through mentorship, motivation and leadership."

"Securing grants will continue to be a central strategy employed by the university to enhance educational experiences for students," said Diulus, "while also addressing healthcare disparities and improving health outcomes, often in underserved or historically marginalized communities."

\$748,250 | D'You Scholars

Stacy Ruvio, PhD received \$748,250 from the National Science Foundation Scholarships in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics Program (S-STEM). The grant aims to "increase the recruitment, enrollment, retention, and graduation of low-income, academically talented biology majors with financial need," said Ruvio, chair of the Department of Natural Sciences and Mathematics. Scholarships will be awarded to 13 students, known



as D'YOU STEM Scholars, who will receive enhanced faculty mentoring and career development and engage in other activities to foster a STEM identity.

\$325,000 | Food Farmacy

Historic winter storms and the May 2022 terrorist attack at the Tops on Buffalo's East Side highlighted and exacerbated food inequities that exist in the city. A \$325,000 grant from United Healthcare will create a responsive Food Farmacy that addresses social determinants of health. Led by interim dean of the School of Health Professions Megan Whelan, PhD, RDN, CDN, and Renee Cadzow, PhD, associate director of the Center for Doctoral Studies and Research, as well as Nutrition Empowerment Program Director Rachel Laster '20, MS, RDN, CDN, the project will distribute



train community health workers on how to address food insecurity.

\$250,000 | Diversifying Employment Pipelines

emergency food kits through community partners and

Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield is providing \$250,000 for the Pathways Pharmacy Technician Program—a healthcare workforce training initiative offered to pharmacy techs, nurse assistants, and community healthcare workers who have been historically excluded from educational opportunities. According to project lead and Title III Program Director **Leona Soule, MEd**, "This program helps these students enter the healthcare workforce with meaningful



credentials, specialized training and soft skills."

\$185,000 | Improving Community Health and Well-being

The Mother Cabrini Health
Foundation is providing
funds for the Nutrition
Empowerment Program,
which improves the health
and well-being of community
members by increasing food
access, nutrition knowledge,
and cooking skills. Registered dietitians
work with community members and
offer free cooking classes, nutrition
education sessions and a warm weather

Dopesick Author Beth Macy Addresses the Dimensions of Addiction

As new D'Youville graduates stood on the cusp of stepping into the world as health professionals, they were reminded of their vital role in helping address societal challenges at the university's spring commencement.

On a day of both reflection and hope, 474 undergraduates and 320 graduate students received their D'Youville degrees.

As the culmination of the university's year-long focus on the opioid epidemic, journalist and writer **Beth Macy** served as commencement speaker.

"As a huge fan of D'Youville University and the work you're all doing to bring health care and humanity to the least of us, I appreciate the honor of speaking to you," said Macy, a *New York Times*-bestselling author and executive producer of the Hulu series based on her book, *Dopesick*.

Macy, who was awarded an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from D'Youville, encouraged graduates to spend their time "engaged in meaningful work...that enriches our larger community."

Offering the event's salutatory address, graduating senior Christian Gochez '23, a veteran of the U.S. Coast Guard, spoke from his perspective as a non-traditional student.

"From what I've seen, this generation isn't waiting for anyone's approval. They will do what they set their mind to," said Gochez, who will pursue a PhD in social policy at Brandeis University. "This world is a better place because of this class."



A CENTURY OF STUDENT LEADERS

Honoring D'Youville Tradition, Student Government Drives Positive Change

When a fire at a residence near campus recently left a D'Youville student in immediate need of food and shelter, a Student Government Association (SGA) emergency fund provided accommodations and stability while longer-term remedies were explored.

It worked just as **John Rizk** intended. As the president of SGA—and firstever to be elected to three terms—he helped establish the new budget line to support students in urgent and dire circumstances.

"This is what we're here for," said Rizk, a fifth-year Doctor of Pharmacy student. "To make sure students are taken care of, comfortable, and getting the most out of their college experience."



Dedication to Students

For more than a century, SGA has played a significant role in shaping student life at D'Youville.

Shortly after the organization was established at the institution, the 1922 *D'Youvillian* yearbook stated: "Student government teaches responsibility to youth by *giving responsibility*—which results in student initiative and executive ability."

SGA proves to be a training ground for future leaders—in diplomacy, negotiation, and consensus-building. As small-scale democracy-inaction, the organization epitomizes the ideals of representation, civil discourse, and accountability.

The experience of **Sheila Sloan '75** was no exception. Serving as SGA president her senior year, Sloan met often with then-President **Sister Mary Charlotte Barton**, who "was interested in working with students and hearing our perspective."

"No matter what, my agenda was to represent students and advocate for our position," said Sloan, a retired licensed architect living in Rochester. "And I feel like we were heard." Historically, SGA has awarded scholarships, staged key annual events and run intramural leagues, among other activities.

During Rizk's first two terms, his administration—consisting of elected senators and members-at-large—has focused on creating student jobs, extending hours of services, and creating partnerships with off-campus community groups to boost volunteerism.

"Students come to SGA to change things on campus," said Rizk, "because we've proven to be a functioning body that serves their needs."

Nurturing Leaders

While Rizk leverages his position to aid other students, SGA has also contributed to his personal growth.

Born in Canada and raised by native Egyptians—who worked in Saudi Arabia for the first 15 years of his life—Rizk attended high school in northern Ohio before enrolling at D'Youville.

"I had to put myself out there—I knew no one," he said. "This organization gives students a chance to join a community and create their own story."

This academic year, Rizk is serving an unprecedented third term—possible given his enrollment in the six-year pharmacy program.

"It's a chance for consistency of leadership," he said, "to offer stability."

Fairness and Progress

For Sloan, her mid-70's presidency coincided with a period of intense change at D'Youville—reflective of deeper shifts at a college seeking to modernize. Unquestionably, it was not the same institution attended by her mother, **Marie Carberry '44**.

These changes also offered new opportunities—SGA was invited to Board of Trustee meetings for the first time. The college also altered its charter—losing aspects of its Catholic affiliation—to gain eligibility for state funding.

Men enrolled at D'Youville for the first time during Sloan's freshman year. When she ran for president, her opponent was one of the six men in her class. "In all things, I sought to be fair," said Sloan, "and include all who wanted to be involved."

In the generation since her presidency, the now-university has undergone further transformations. Still, SGA has—and is poised to continue to—serve as an incubator of ideas and leaders, and give students a seat at the table.

"It's our job to keep building on progress," Rizk said, "that can be passed to the next president."









Four Women, Four Graduates, **One Legacy**

D'Youville's First Four-Alumni Family has been Part of the University for More Than 100 Years As a sophomore, **Katie Gazda '22** was walking up a staircase in the Koessler Administration Building when she spotted something familiar out of the corner of her eye. Approaching a picture of the Class of 1983, she recognized the signature of her late mother, **Kitty (Murrett) Gazda '83**.

"My mom had the tiniest, neatest handwriting," said Gazda. "It felt like a sign I was in the right place."

When Gazda graduated last year, with a degree in biology, she became the first fourth-generation alumna in D'Youville's 115-year history.

She was preceded at the institution by her great-grandmother, Helen (Desmond)
Mahaney 1917; grandmother Mary
(Mahaney) Murrett '49; and her mother—a nurse and administrator at Erie County
Medical Center—who passed away in 2013, when Gazda was 13.

The distinction carries special importance to Gazda, especially considering how uncommon it was for women to attend college when her great-grandmother was a member of the institution's sixth-ever graduating class.

"When I'd have a challenging day, I'd think about the three generations of strong women in my family walking these exact same hallways," said Gazda, who is pursuing a master's degree at the university and serves on the Alumni Association Board. "I knew I belonged here. If anyone belongs here, it's me."

Following in Family Footsteps

After Gazda lost her mother, she spent more time with her grandmother, "and I learned about our legacy at D'Youville and wanted it to continue." It's easy to see why.

"It's impossible to give a full picture of how much I loved it there," said Murrett, who turned 95 this year.

In the mid-1940's, she lived with her parents in the Northtowns—taking two buses to get to campus, where she had a full day of classes every day.

Post-World War II, she and her fellow students often attracted the notice of caravans of male students from Canisius College, as "they circled campus every day, we'd wait by the windows," she said, adding, "I married one of them."

After graduating, Murrett followed in the footsteps of her mother, becoming an educator and teaching Latin at the renowned City Honors High School in Buffalo.

"Because my mother went to college, my parents made it a mission to send me, too—no matter what it took," said Murrett. "I felt no different when raising Kitty—who raised Katie the same way. It's understood that education is important to us."

While the institution—and the world—have undoubtedly changed in the decades separating the D'Youville experiences of the four alumni, there are indelible similarities.

"We both thought it was a lot of work," said Gazda.

"We both had a lot of fun," Murrett added, laughing. "I'm really so proud of her."

Speaking Through Science

Fearless Forensic Pathologist, Public Health Trailblazer

Before Marcella Farinelli Fierro '62, MD became one of the first female forensic pathologists in the country—or the inspiration for the protagonist in crime thrillers that have sold more than 100 million copies worldwide—she was a 10-year-old girl certain of her career path. She'd be a doctor or bust.

"Things either fit with the plan. Or if not—next," said Fierro. "It made all decisions very easy."

Growing up in north Buffalo, Fierro tended to her father, who died after a long illness when she was just 14. The experience "put me in caregiver mode" and sparked an interest in the field of medicine for her and her sister, **Linda Farinelli Stanek '67**, now a retired nurse.

In 1958, Fierro enrolled at D'Youville to major in biology, and along the way, developed her appreciation for the Grey Nuns, who taught at her high school—the now-closed Holy Angels Academy—and operated the college at the time.

"The Grey Nuns were scholars—and a model of leadership for women. Which was very hard to find in those days," said Fierro, who has a 41-year history of giving to D'Youville. "A college run entirely by women? I thought it was cool."

A Visionary in Civil Service

At a time when there were few women physicians, Fierro earned her Doctor of Medicine degree from what's now known as the University at Buffalo Jacobs School Of Medicine And Biomedical Sciences.

Gravitating toward pathology—studying the nature and causes of disease and injury—Fierro eventually embraced a subspecialty of medicine, forensic pathology.

She's heavily influenced the profession on a global scale.

As a forensic pathologist,
Fierro examined suspicious and
non-natural deaths—commonly
through autopsies—and often in
concert with criminal or civil law
cases. Spanning thousands of
investigations, Fierro estimates only
one percent of her "patients" ended
up with an undetermined cause or
method of death.

In 1994, Fierro was appointed the first-ever women medical examiner in Virginia. She revolutionized the position, becoming a staunch



advocate for public health—using the data her office collected to compel the commonwealth's legislature to address preventable deaths, including domestic violence and drownings. "Public health was not a focus," she said, "but I made it a focus."

From Autopsy Room to the Page

Along the way, then unpublished author **Patricia Cornwell** began to shadow Fierro, whose hardworking nature and personality can be seen in Kay Scarpetta, the central character in 27 best-

selling crime novels who—as Virginia's chief medical examiner—uses forensic technology and her instincts to solve grisly and mysterious murders.

"I don't know where my life would have gone if I had not met her," Cornwell told *Richmond Magazine* in 2009, the year after Fierro retired. "She's the most brilliant forensic pathologist I have ever met."

Before Fierro's pioneering career, her profession had almost no public profile. Now, it's a subject of fascination and an array of entertainment and reality content.

Post-retirement, Fierro has used her clout to act as an advocate, co-authoring a National Academy of Sciences study credited with strengthening standards in her industry.

"I always aimed to see something good come out of misery and death," she said. "It can help the living."

The event highlighted several no-cost public services available to students and the surrounding community, including D'Youville's Food Farmacy. There were free health screenings, educational stations, cooking demonstrations and a free hot meal.

The Bills' 2022 nominee for the Walter Payton Man of the Year Award, Dawkins encouraged attendees to take advantage of the resources right in their neighborhood. Dawkins and his foundation worked with UnitedHealthcare to sponsor the event.

"With my career and my life, health is one of the biggest things," Dawkins said to the crowd.

Nourishing Minds and Bodies

The Food Farmacy started in October 2021, through a partnership between D'Youville, Catholic Health and FeedMore WNY. It is funded by UnitedHealthcare, through their Empowering Health initiative launched in 2018.

The Food Farmacy provides participating community members a three-day supply of healthy food, twice a month, as well as counseling with a registered dietitian, health screenings and cooking demonstrations.

"I think anytime somebody can get food and be able to feed their family is the ultimate win, because food is expensive, and healthy food is expensive," Dawkins said.

Speaking at the event, **Joyce**Markiewicz '80, CEO of Catholic

Health, said that the impact of the program has been clear.

"I'm proud to report that over the last 18 months, the Food Farmacy has provided 58,416 pounds of food to 1,098 members of this community," she said.

Fueling Wellness—Close to Home and Beyond

The event occurred as Buffalo approached the anniversary of the racist mass shooting at the Tops Markets on the city's east side, which prompted an ongoing focus on providing resources to people living in food deserts, or places

with limited access to affordable and healthy foods.

Junior Harewood, CEO of Employee and Individual Plans for UnitedHealthcare of New York, noted how social and economic factors have a heavy impact on people as they try to eat better.

"For a lot of folks, they want to be healthy," Harewood said. "But a lot of times, access to fresh food is not available to them. And then, other offers (that) are a lot cheaper. So, if we can bring fresh food at a reasonable or no costs, it helps the community in general."

Harewood said that sometimes if someone grows up in an environment that is not food secure, they may fall back on the type of diet they were used to as a young person.

"It's kind of changing the trend of that cycle, and (getting) people educated," Harewood said. "And sometimes, just awareness is enough for people to kind of get on that path of eating healthy foods."

Bills offensive linemen **David Quessenberry**, **Greg Mancz**, **Ryan Van Denmark** and **Alec Anderson**were also in attendance. Dawkins
said it "means everything" to see
his teammates come out to support
the event.

"I literally just put it in a group message and my guys came," Dawkins said. "They just popped up, no questions asked. So, it's definitely a nice thing."









Escaping the Ukrainian Conflict

Embracing Opportunity

Providing an opportunity to pursue an education far from the dangers of war, D'Youville welcomed 11 Ukrainian students last fall.

Over the last year, these students have immersed themselves in Buffalo and their studies. Common to all 11 students—who have been provided full-tuition scholarships and room and board—is a goal to return to their home country to help rebuild once the war is over.

This summer, several of the students took advantage of staying on campus—serving internships or volunteering to gain professional experience and contacts.

Finding Refuge and Purpose

Yaroslav Malynych was the first student to apply to D'Youville. A chemistry major from Lviv—in western Ukraine—Malynych excelled academically in his first year.



He spent his summer in an internship shadowing oncologist **Nataliya Buxbaum** at Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center and studying liquid chromatography, an analytical chemistry technique. He also assisted and observed Buxbaum, whose lab is a developing noninvasive method for diagnosing graftversus-host disease in transplant patients.

"Chemistry is the basis for developing solutions. I hope to make a difference—in any way I can—and contribute to my country's future," said Malynych. "D'Youville offered an opportunity to for me to grow and make an impact."

Max Poplavsky, a biology major, also interned at Roswell Park with Buxbaum—assisting, and observing research in her lab. He aspires to be a pharmacist.

"I am so thankful to be here and am amazed by how much I am learning," he said. "The campus is beautiful

Community Contributions

Fellow Ukrainian students **Vlad Komarov** and **Milana Cherniaieva** spent the summer volunteering at FoodFarmacy—the food pantry located in D'Youville's Health Professions Hub—sorting and distributing provisions.

Katie Morris, a FoodFarmacy dietitian, said, "We had a number of Ukrainian immigrants utilize our services, and our students spoke with them in Ukrainian to help them feel at home in Buffalo."

Komarov and Cherniaieva enjoyed being able to help and support new refugees.

"It felt good to make a difference," said Komarov. "I can't help at home yet, but in Buffalo I can talk with people from other countries and make them feel welcome."

In addition to volunteer work, internships and reading ahead for their second year at

D'Youville, the Ukrainian students headed to Camp Turk, a summer camp in Oneida, for a few days to mentor Ukrainian high school students visiting the United States.

"I really enjoyed talking with some of the younger girls," said Cherniaieva.
"I was able to talk to them about American fashion and we were amazed at the differences between our home country and [the U.S.]. But mostly I think we all enjoyed the chance to talk in Ukrainian and reassure the younger campers that everyone is so supportive and invested in helping our country—now more than ever."

Preceptor Nurtures the Future of Nursing

Alumna Guides Compassionate Care Behind the Scenes—Including at Home

When **Stefania Fynn-Aikins '05** graduated from D'Youville and became a psychiatric nurse practitioner, there were few others in her profession. Often, she wished for a mentor to help answer questions or provide guidance.

Now, as a veteran nurse, she serves as preceptor—a licensed clinician who teaches and coaches nursing students during clinical rotations—helping them translate theory and training into real-world practice.

"My job is to teach by example," said Fynn-Aikins. "It's essential for nurses to accumulate experiences, and I strive to make them more knowledgeable about their patients and profession." She added, "I try to be the voice I wish I'd had when starting out. And give a dose of reality, when needed."

Caring Runs in the Family

Attending D'Youville as an adult student, Fynn-Aikins completed the RN-to-BSN program while working full-time and raising her family. She credits the university for establishing a learning environment where she could study, work and grow thanks to a network of fellow students and supportive professors.

Board certified in psychiatry since 2007, Fynn-Aikins has started her own practice—Erie Niagara Psychiatry, PLLC—where she continues to provide private consultations to hospitals and nursing homes. She also serves as a psych NP at BryLin Behavioral Health Center and Mercy Hospital of Buffalo.

Fynn-Aikins is frank—being a psych NP "is not glamorous," she said. "My role as preceptor is to help those who choose this field understand the expectations. It's not easy—but incredibly rewarding."

Her guidance is effective. For proof, look no further than one of her new colleagues—her daughter, **Aba Aikins '23**—who graduated from D'Youville's Psych Nurse Practitioner Program in August.

"I'm incredibly proud of her," said Fynn-Aikins. "In the field of nursing, no matter what your specialty—or relationship—there's a camaraderie and sense of belonging to something bigger than oneself."

ELLEN NEWTON IS GUIDED BY GIVING BACK

Connecting with Billie Jean King and the WSF

The VanDerveer Fellowship is one of the most coveted grants of its kind in collegiate sports. In fact, the Women's Sports Foundation (WSF) selects only 10 nationwide each year.

As a leader and mentor to student-athletes and others, D'Youville coach **Ellen Newton** is among a select group to be awarded the fellowship—now two years in a row.

From the Field to the Clipboard

Named for legendary Stanford University women's basketball coach Tara VanDerveer, the grant provides opportunities for women coaches to participate in professional development such as conferences, workshops, and leadership programs.

Newton credits the fellowship for contributing to her growth as a coach and mentor.

"I'm still finding my voice as a young female coach," said Newton, an assistant coach of women's lacrosse, as well as a strength and conditioning coach. "It's exciting to learn and use new knowledge to be a better leader and example for others."

Added Newton, "Opportunities can be few for women in sports, so I strive to be a role model for our student-athletes—and be someone they can always come to with questions, so they feel comfortable and supported."

After graduating from Canisius University in 2019, where she lettered in lacrosse, Newton began coaching at D'Youville. After earning a Master of Science degree from the university in occupational therapy (OT) two years later, Newton was elevated from a graduate assistant to assistant lacrosse coach.

Working with goalkeepers, Newton played an integral role in the Saints' first-ever East Coast Conference (ECC) Championship semifinal appearance. Then, in 2022-23, the team performed nearly as well, again reaching the ECC Tournament.

Born to Lead

This academic year, Newton is taking on a larger role in Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAC), which supports community outreach programs and mentoring of young leaders.

"Giving back has always been a passion," she said—including working with special needs children or those from underserved or socioeconomically disadvantaged communities.

As a former college athlete, Newton understands the benefits of participating in team sports and wants to ensure student-athletes and youth can benefit from the same opportunities and experiences.

"As the eldest of four kids," said Newton, "I feel as though I was naturally born into the role of being a leader."



Transition Triumph

This summer, the NCAA Division II (DII) Membership Committee approved D'Youville University for full Division II membership as part of the East Coast Conference (ECC).

"Our move to DII has been building for many years," said **President Lorrie Clemo, PhD**. "We've enacted a vision to increase athletic opportunities on our campus for student-athletes from all over the world. We've bolstered our athletic program through staffing, recruitment, student-athlete programming, branding, grants, and corporate partnerships."

"Now more than ever, we're positioned as a global institution of education," stated **Ona Halladay**, executive director of intercollegiate athletics.

D'Youville began the membership process in early 2020 and began competing as a provisional member. The latest NCAA approval moves D'Youville to an active member, making teams eligible to compete in postseason championships and eligible to receive awards, honors, and other benefits.

The Journey

Since starting its transition to DII, D'Youville has grown its athletics program with the additions of men's lacrosse, women's track and field, women's wrestling, and women's field hockey. The D'Youville Saints now offer nineteen varsity sports.

Over this period, the Saints have also added over 130 new students to the university—driving recruitment into new national and international markets. Now, student-athletes hail from 25 states and 17 countries—internationalizing the campus with new cultures, philosophies and lived experiences.

This growth has enabled the campus community to grow with annual events, active residence halls, and increased school spirit. That pride has also been fed by athletic success. During its transition period, Saints earned seven First Team All-ECC honors and 21 Second-Team All-Conference selections and many other recognitions of athletic and scholastic achievement.

In 2023, D'Youville earned the NCAA Presidents' Award for Academic Excellence for achieving an academic success rate of at least 90%. As one of the 44 DII schools to earn the award, D'Youville is one of just three ECC institutions, along with Mercy and St. Thomas Aguinas to receive the honor.

We Are the Saints

D'Youville has also enlivened the university community with its rebrand as the Saints. Saint Bernards are known for their life-saving work by performing rescue excursions in the Alps. The breed embodies the dedication and tenacity synonymous with one of the university's guiding principles—serving when needed most.

Recent facility upgrades also ensure the Saints have the tools to be competitive at the DII level, in addition to serving students, faculty, and staff through recreation and intramurals.

The university is also deepening relationships with alumni of its athletic teams by building institutional traditions—such as the Hall of Fame, alumni games, and speaking engagements.

Life in the Balance

A founding pillar of DII is community engagement, which dovetails with the D'Youville mission of service. As Saints, D'Youville student-athletes are leaders who support teammates and are dedicated to service in Buffalo and beyond—in public schools, youth clubs, Team Impact, the Make a Wish Foundation and others.

In 2022, D'Youville received the ECC Community Engagement Award of Excellence for hosting the Lead Her Forward youth clinic promoting athletic participation among women and girls.

Here Come the Saints

As a DII member, D'Youville is eligible to compete against the division's 311 member institutions located in 47 states and the District of Columbia. The division also includes NCAA's only international member university (Simon Fraser in British Columbia, Canada) and three schools in Puerto Rico.

"This is an historical moment for our storied institution—and a testament to collaborative work across our campus throughout the transition process," said Halladay. "The future is bright for D'Youville athletics."

Senior **Brianne Moxley '23** and sophomore **Stella Mollica** earned All-Tournament Team honors. Mollica was also selected to the Second Team All-East Coast Conference (ECC) and Jankovic to the Third Team All-ECC.

Women's bowling was led individually by sophomore **Megan Kapsiak**, who finished ninth out of 76 participants in the DII-DIII Wildcat Invitational. As a team, the Saints achieved their highest finish of the season at the Medaille Brunswick Classic, earning fourth place.

The men's basketball team increased its wins within the ECC by two games. Senior guard **Willie Kondrat**—a USCAA Player of the Week earlier in the season—received All-ECC Second Team honors, after averaging more than 18 points per game.

Women's lacrosse became the first DYU sport to compete in ECC postseason play, facing Mercy University in the semifinal game. Complementing the achievement, sophomore **Brinn**Stworzydlak was named the ECC Goalkeeper of the Year with freshman Sam Newlin being honored as the ECC Rookie of the Year. Stworzydlak was also named to the All-ECC First Team with Newlin, sophomore Sydney Gordon, and freshman Lauren Parker all receiving All-ECC Second Team honors.

Softball continued their recent strong runs into the postseason, clinching a trip to the USCAA World Series for the third consecutive season. Sophomore **Hannah Bardeen** and freshman **Bryanna Dewey** had strong performances in the World Series, both earning USCAA All-Tournament Team honors. Bardeen also received All-ECC First Team honors, with **Gianna Adamo**, **Laura Beck**, **Lauren Booth**, and **Sarah Parzych** each earning Second Team All-ECC honors.





Women's rowing had a strong ending to the 2022-23 season, with a second-place finish in the Women's Club Eight division at The Knecht Cup. The Saints backed up that performance with a first-place finish in the second race of The Black Rock Cup. The season concluded a fourth-place finish at the Jefferson Dad Vail Regatta in the Women's Collegiate JV Four.

During their first season of competition, the outdoor track & field team began on a high note with **Kelly Lucas** placing first in the high jump at the UB Spring Opener. The Saints carried their momentum into the Brockport Invitational as the 4x400M relay team of **Lexie Hillman**, **Tsianna Barnwell**, **Sevilla Groebe**, and **Kelly Lucas** took third place. DYU concluded their season at the ECC Outdoor Track & Field Championships, where Groebe was named All-ECC Second Team in the 400M hurdles.













The Saints baseball team put together a record-breaking 2023 campaign, earning the most wins in program history, with 21. DYU also set eight team records throughout the memorable season. Billy Morris was the catalyst of the squad, earning ABCA/Rawlings First Team All-Region, NCBWA All-East Region, and All-ECC First Team honors. Ethan Hammond, Chris AuClair, and Samuel Worthen were named to the All-ECC Second Team.

Entering their second season of competition, the men's lacrosse team recorded their first win in program history, knocking-off Dominican University in a 13-12 thriller. The Saints went on to capture three additional wins—including notching the program's first-ever conference triumph, defeating the University of District of Columbia. The team saw vast improvements from a year ago, scoring over 100 more goals and achieved improvements in assists, ground balls, and caused turnovers.
